


### **Enrolment Trends**

Across the province, students and parents continue to explore alternative school programs and the opportunities they provide. Having experienced a peak population of 1800 students during the 2020/21 academic year, NorthStar continues to see enrolment numbers that are double those prior to the COVID pandemic. We are now consistently providing learner-focused, Christ-empowered learning to nearly 1500 students.

Although we continue to see lower enrolment numbers within our Grade 1 to 9 teacher-directed program, NorthStar Academy was excited to welcome 72 new students into our parent-directed kindergarten program this year. In addition, we are piloting a new Hybrid Learning Huddle program for our Grade 1 to 9 students. This program has risen from the expressed interest by students and families for greater in-person learning opportunities and a desire to connect more intentionally with our students' local communities.


In our high school program, we continue to see an increase in our enrolment numbers. This growth is due, in part, to our successful school partnership program that offers non-primary high school credits to other community and Christian schools. We now have six such partnerships.

#### **Enrolment Counts**
















### **Every Student is Successful**

#### **Diploma Examination Acceptable Standard**










### **Every Student is Successful**

To support the achievement of Goal 1, NorthStar Academy will:

- Continue to prioritize the provision of timely descriptive feedback to students and use this feedback to make appropriate instructional adjustments.
- Build student self-assessment opportunities into our course instruction tying them directly to the course outcomes and individual student goals.
- Explore how to use portfolios effectively in our course instruction as a way to increase student agency and provide for differentiation.
- Establish a biweekly, community-base Hybrid Learning Huddle program that invites students in Grades 1 to 9 to come together for in-person, hands-on learning with an emphasis on science, art, physical education, wellness and Bible.
- Continue to utilize our online course design checklist and online learning essential elements rubric to improve our online course design.
- Develop a new assessment re-do policy based on last year's professional development work around assessment.
- Participate in Golden Hill's Grade 1 to 6 new curriculum professional development program and work collaboratively to re-design our print-based resource courses.


Our strategies continued:


- Invite our First Nation, Métis, and Inuit liaison to review our current resources and recommend new options for use within both our teacherdirected and parent-directed programs.

- Provide opportunities for our First Nation, Métis, and Inuit liaison to facilitate a variety of professional development activities.




### **Every Student Belongs**










# Goal 2 Every Student Belongs

To support the achievement of Goal 2, NorthStar Academy will:

- Continue to expand our grade level homeroom program based on the "Go-To Educator" model.
- Leverage technology to facilitate more opportunities for student-student and student-teacher collaboration and conversations within our Moodle classrooms.
- Restructure our attendance procedures to better support student engagement and well-being by prioritizing more timely interventions and greater partnership opportunities with families.
- Continue to utilize our virtual Moodle Hallways and Homeroom classrooms to showcase student learning and host various celebration events and school community challenges, such as our Read-a-Thon.
- Participate in Golden Hill's Leadership series with Dr. David Tranter and work collaboratively with NorthStar's teacher-leaders to develop additional well-being supports for students and teachers.
- Include opportunities within our Community Connections program for students to develop their knowledge and understanding of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit culture, history, and contributions.


- Invite our First Nation, Métis, and Inuit liaison to be a guest teacher in our live classroom and homeroom Google Meets
- Continue to expand our Community Connections program, which includes our Activity Day field trips, learning clusters, workshops and High School Limitless program.






## Literacy and Numeracy Success for all Learners

At NorthStar Academy we recognize that there continues to be learning gaps coming out of the COVID pandemic. We also understand that many of our students join our program from various entrance points and with different educational experiences and goals. Literacy and numeracy are often the focus for our students individualized learning goals. With this in mind, NorthStar Academy has recently renewed its focus on literacy and numeracy success for all learners. Leveraging Alberta Education's Early Years assessment data, our elementary and junior high teachers are working to identify the literacy and numeracy skills that require greater instructional supports, while also building individualized support plans for those students who require more specialized supports.














## Literacy and Numeracy Success for all Learners

To support the achievement of Goal 3, NorthStar Academy will:

- Establish a more comprehensive benchmarking process in our elementary program and use the collected data to inform instruction and targeted early intervention.
- Redistribute the allocated time assigned to our Grade 1 to 9 Math and Language Arts courses, as part of our course redesign process.
- Establish a new learning and assessment teacher-leader who will help support teachers with the implementation of our provincial, divisional, and school-based assessments and the needed instructional and intervention responses required, as follow-up.
- Utilize online subscriptions, as part of our at-risk intervention supports for individual students.
- Participate in Golden Hill's Grade 1 to 6 new curriculum professional development program and work collaboratively with our grade level groups to re-design our print-based resource courses.
